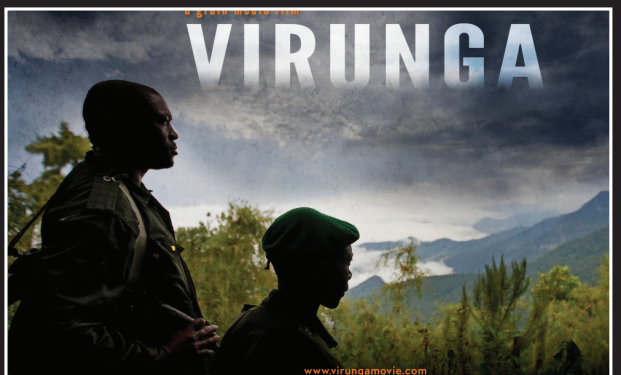

One Earth Film Festival returns with 41 screenings of acclaimed short and feature length environmental films in 30 locations throughout the greater Chicago metropolitan area. 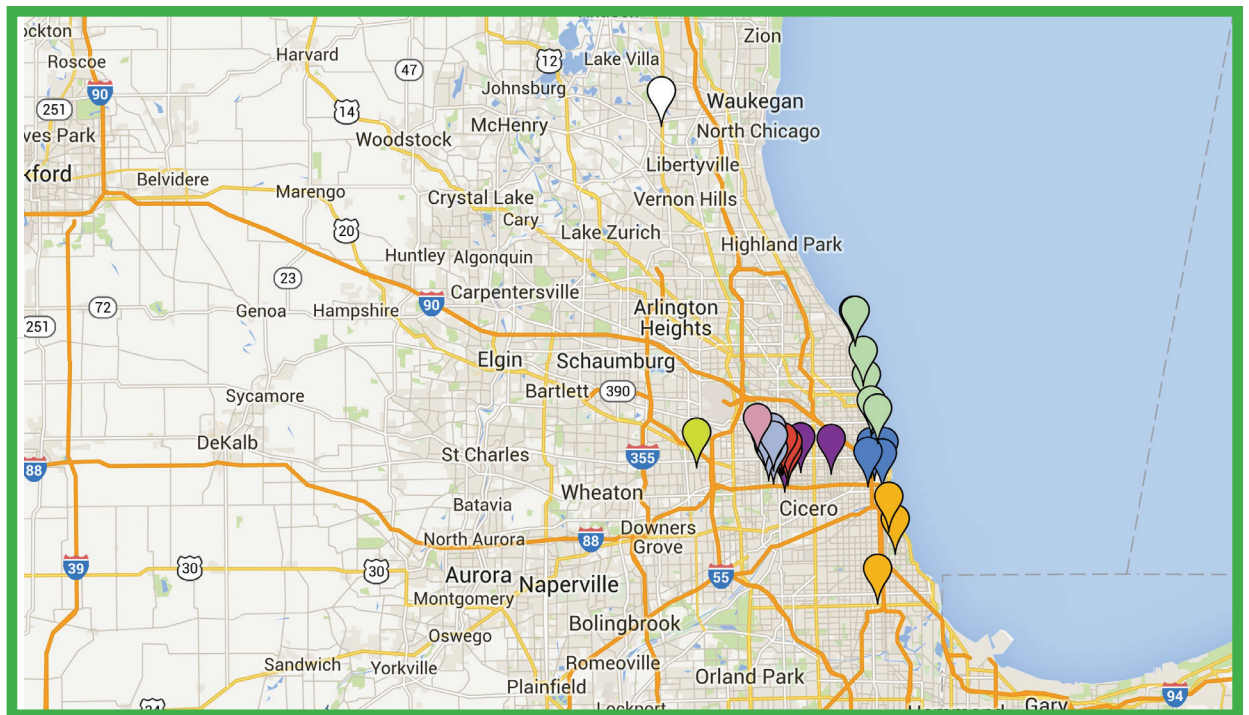

The One Earth Film Festival 2015 Film Selection Committee is pleased to bring you the following films, and wishes to thank the incredible filmmakers (noted below) whose important work helps raise awareness of sustainability issues and challenges, in addition to providing examples of success and solutions to emulate (and upon which to build).

Each year, the Selection Committee begins many months in advance of the festival, conducting research, soliciting recommendations, and amassing a list of several hundred environmental films for vetting.
